Mitch notices a stack of newspapers that Morrie had obviously read. Mitch is surprised that Morrie keeps up with the news. They discuss some news happening in the world and Morrie cries. The flashback of this section takes place in one of Mitch's college classes with Morrie. Morrie enters the room and remains silent for about 15 minutes. The students feel uncomfortable, which leads to a discussion about silence. Morrie tells Mitch after class that Mitch reminds him of himself. Notes Morrie is still interested in world news even though he is close to death. Talking about the war in Bosnia, Mitch begins to cry because he says he can "feel their anguish" (50). We can say that Mitch is uncomfortable with Morrie's crying. Morrie tells Mitch that one day she will untie him and show him that it is okay for a man to cry. Morrie explains that he thinks the most important thing in life is to learn to give and receive love. He thinks that many do not believe they deserve love, but that "love is the only rational act" (52). That said Mitch gave Morrie a hug and a kiss, agreeing to meet him again the following Tuesday. We see Mitch opening up very slowly to Morrie, like he did once in college. Morrie says that most people are afraid of "What if today is my last day on earth" (64)? Would they be happy with their lives? Would they release their inner child or help others? Mitch feels uncomfortable at this point; imagined on his desk, writing a story, and his publishers greedily snatch the story while being taken away into the ambulance until his death. The book recounts each of Albom's fourteen visits to Schwartz, complemented by lessons and life experiences of Schwartz and interspersed with flashbacks and references to contemporary events. After being diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), Morrie spends the last few days giving his former student Mitch his last lesson in life.
