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Having an undersized tail and little magnitude, Northern Saw whet Owl is one of those types of owls that possess the big skull. In addition, unlike traditional owls, they also have large yellowish eyes while the facial frame contains a whitish fantasy pile that surrounds the eyes. At the edge of the frame, there is a white-grey strip that wraps the whole disk. However, the main part of the skull is largely composed of gray-brown shades and colourless bands to the front. The whole structure of these owls is wrapped with a substance of red-brown feathers with marks on the back.
