A lot of it has to do with nostalgia—I'm instantly transported back to fourth grade, parked in front of my television playing Pokémon Snap on Nintendo 64 for hours. Apparently, the supenerd that loved fictional anime critters still lives within me. Every single news item about the game is brilliant. The stories are insane, and they keep getting better. Some situations players have gotten themselves into thus far: People are getting laid. (What a magical love story!) There are conspiracy theories that it's run by the Illuminati. Pickpocketers are targeting unsuspecting players using "Lure Modules" on the app. This guy's property is being invaded because it's a "gym." I'm sure there will be more in the near future, but these are real gems. It's a hilarious conversation starter. As I've discovered fellow enthusiasts—colleagues, friends of friends, strangers on the street—I find that our bond grows deeper. And for those who challenge the idea of the game, it's just a funny topic to debate. It furthers the idea of what an app (whether it's a game or not) can be. To get deep, I think this is the future. It's only a matter of time until augmented reality shopping or food-delivery apps start launching, and I'll be ready. If you haven't downloaded the game yet, I encourage you to do so. If you have no desire to play, do it anyway to see what the future of technology will look like. The only cons? If you're the type of person to feel embarrassed about walking down the street, taking a selfie-style Snapchat, playing Pokémon Go is on another level. However, there are actually some decent Pokemon apps out there. These apps help you keep track of your physical or digital Pokemon collection, show you guides for the various digital games, and otherwise help you interact with the game at large. It has a metric ton of information about each game, each game's Pokemon, and various guides and how-to articles. It boasts a collection of 31,000 entries across all games, various walkthroughs and guides, and it works offline. Some other features include a multi-tab mode for viewing multiple guides at once and a history function to quickly recall something you viewed. It's free to use on its own but you can optionally pay to remove ads and get other features. It's not bad aside from some intrusive ads and some freezing issues. In addition, the app can tell you where Pokemon are available for capture, what moves they can all learn, a list of all items from each game, and more. The pro version even has a team builder option. It lets you upload Pokemon from most of the recent games and lets you transfer them to other games. There are some limitations. For instance, Sword and Shield don't have support for all Pokemon. However, it's a great way to manage your collection otherwise. The app also lets you trade with folks, keep track of the national Pokedex, and even receive Mystery Gifts. There are some limitations, but it's the best way to swap Pokemon between games. The Pokemon Company has an official app for this kind of stuff, but it's honestly not that good. TCG Hub lets you scan your cards in and keep track of them. You can compare your collection to the national Pokedex to see the gaps in your collection. Additionally, the app lets you sync your collection to the cloud, create a wishlist for cards you want, simulate trades, and you can even join the app's Discord server. All the features are available in the free version and the pro version is entirely optional. Bonus: 1000+ Poke Wallpapers by Fans Price: Free 1000+ Poke Wallpapers by Fans is, well, a wallpaper app. It features about 1,000 Pokemon-inspired wallpapers from fan submissions and other sources. The app tries to give credit whenever it can and some wallpapers are specific only to this app. Some other features include the ability to auto-change wallpapers, the ability to save wallpapers, and more. Some of the designs are legitimately good and most of them should work on most devices. There are even some AMOLED-friendly ones. The app is entirely free with ads. If this one isn't doing it for you, there are at least a dozen others on the Play Store and probably a couple of subreddits for it.
